The road condition is sad to say the least, as they are not putting in any effort to maintain it, extremely corrugated,


We drove up Ganaga pass up to the viewpoint and stopped at Ganaga Lodge for lunch.





After lunch we took a short loop jeep track and stop at another viewpoint and realized how privileged we are to do what we do and live in the Western Cape with beautiful place to go and explore.


