Esselbank Adventure Through the Rugged Northern Cederberg - 25-27 April

A Weekend of Trails, Culture, and Camaraderie

The Cederberg once again delivered on every front - dusty trails, epic scenery, deep cultural roots and memories that will be retold around many more fires. Led by Rob Nel, this action-packed long weekend from **Saturday 25 April to Monday 27 April 2025** brought together a passionate crew of adventurers for a two-day expedition through the **Northern Cederberg**, a region known for its raw, untamed beauty.




Designed for those who crave the perfect blend of off-road excitement, panoramic mountain views and cultural immersion, this journey checked every box: **river crossings**, **rocky tracks**, **historic towns** and even a bit of drama, just to keep things interesting.

The Route: Passes, Paintings & Pitstops

We kicked off the adventure at **Traveller's Rest** for a hearty breakfast and a briefing of what awaited. After a quick deflate of the tyres, we heading straight toward **Engelsmanskloof** before turning into **Wupperthal** for a quick tour of the historic village and its famed **Skoen Fabriek**. From there, we pushed toward the **Esselbank Waterfalls**, then detoured to **Oasis** for a well-earned snack and cold one.

Our base for the weekend was the ever-charming **Nuwerust Rest Camp**, a secluded gem tucked between the towering sandstone cliffs - offering a blend of rustic comfort and unmatched starry skies.

Day two saw us navigating toward **Stadsaal Caves**, where Rob (yours truly) gained a new scar on his Ford Ranger courtesy of a rather sneaky pole - easily patched up at **Kromrivier** with a few trusty cable ties. We continued on to **Truitjieskraal**, where rock climbers provided entertainment for the group

with their gravity-defying ascents. A scenic route back to Nuwerust capped off the day's excitement, with some diehards squeezing in a last visit to **Oasis**.

Evenings were spent in true club fashion: big fires, cold drinks, laughter echoing into the night and stories passed around with smoky fingers and warm hearts.

Navigation, Comms & Safety

Thanks to years of experience in the Cederberg, Rob relied on local knowledge backed up by **Tracks4Africa**, with VHF comms keeping the convoy tight and well-informed. A big thanks to **Fred** for keeping the tail in check as Rear-End Charlie.

Despite a few mildly washed-out tracks from recent rains, all obstacles were easily tackled - even by the **2x4 Ford Rangers** in the group. And while there were no recoveries or medical issues, the trip took a brief turn toward rescue drama on Sunday night...

Rescue Ready - A Late-Night False Alarm

After a lively Saturday night of beer pong next door (not us!), things quieted down dramatically on Sunday. When Marius mentioned that two campers had gone hiking to **Wolfberg Cracks** and hadn't returned by late evening, Rob's **Search and Rescue instincts** kicked in.

A quick check at the trailhead and alert to the relevant authorities turned out to be a proactive precaution - thankfully, the pair had simply detoured to **Oasis** for a bite before making their way back. All's well that ends well, but it was a timely reminder of the importance of preparedness in these remote mountains.


Reflections

The food on offer was also good and enjoyed by all ...














